Ph.D., and I have the joy of working as Director of the Asian American and Asian Resource and Cultural Center (AAARCC) at Purdue University. I am a Boilermaker who completed my doctorate degree from the American Studies program at Purdue. My special connection with the AAARCC started during my time as a graduate student, participating in the organization Asian Pacific American Caucus (APAC), part of final efforts to ask the university to open a cultural center to share the diversity of Asian America.

The AAARCC was founded in Spring 2015 as a result of continued and dedicated efforts especially from students, but also supported by faculty, staff, alumni, and community members. To see a dream of many Boilermakers (years before APAC's work) finally coming to fruition was incredible, but to have the opportunity to lead it- it is very special! This Fall 2024 will be my fifth year in this role, and as I reflect on the work that the AAARCC has been doing, it is without a doubt that my heart is filled with gratitude. What started as a one-room office at

Stewart Center in 2015 is now a facility (a home!) at 915 5th Street, bursting at the seams, with pedagogical, cultural, and advocacy programming in collaboration with campus and community partners.

As the AAARCC summer hours are coming to a close, we are gearing up to welcome the 2024-2025 academic year and our 10th anniversary of weaving diverse Asian American and Asian communities into Purdue's campus life. Ten years of walking alongside our Boilermakers, the AAARCC has grown into a space where, through understanding the diverse histories and lived experiences of Asian and Asian American communities, we are weaving meaningful journey of identities, academic excellence, and personal and professional flourishing for all Boilermakers.


