Closure of the Patty Jischke Early Care & Education

On December 6, 2019 the Physical Facilities Committee of the Board of Trustees of Purdue University voted unanimously to approve a plan to finance, construct and award contract for a "new 16,600 square foot facility ... [that would] serve approximately 150 children, ... because the Patty Jischke Early Care and Education Center would be demolished." Construction of the new building wwas proposed to take place from June – December, 2020. [cf. item II.B. [cf. item II.B. https://earchives.lib.purdue.edu/digital/collection/bot/id/40052/rec/2]

Initiation of the building phase of this project was postponed due to spending measures being put into place in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

On January 29th, 2021 families at the Patty Jischke Early Care and Education Center were notified that the center will close on June 1, 2021 despite the fact that the building planned as a replacement for the current center has not been constructed.

There are no current plans in place to initiate construction, rather Purdue Research Foundation announced that it "will embark on a market study on child care needs in the community now and in the future." [Purdue Today, 1/29/21]

Availability of childcare remains a critical factor in promoting employment equity and also constitutes a significant opportunity for recruitment and retention of faculty and staff.

Multiple publications in the past year have described the impacts within academia directly related to childcare and household labor burdens during the pandemic. Each publication has uniformly reported disproportionate negative consequence for women, particularly those who are junior in their careers.

The impact of childcare burdens on our own faculty have been shown to disproportionately affect women across all ranks.



Caregiving Responsibilities

 - ✓ 16% seniors







Caregiving Concerns and Well-Being

Differences by Gender

Caregiving Needs and Second Shift

Women with dependents who live with partners tend to take on more "second shift" work (domestic labor) compared with men with dependents who live with partners.

Variable	Men with dependents		Women with dependents		
Live with a partner	92%		83%		
Feel always on call in relation to CG responsibilities	41% who do not live w/partner	32% who live w/partner	43% who do not live w/partner	46% who live w/partner	



Importance of Child Care Availability

- Both women and men with dependents are working more hours and experiencing more struggles with child care and stress compared with those women and men who do not have dependents
- Women with dependents are working more hours in categories that do not typically support promotion and tenure (i.e., service)
- Women with dependents are showing greater signs of burnout when compared with men with dependents.
- No difference in burnout for women living with or without partners while men living with partners are looking a bit better
- The Greater Lafayette child care availability is not sufficient to meet current demands
- Removing the Patty Jischke Early Care & Education Center without creating other available options will be a serious problem for faculty and staff with dependents, especially women
