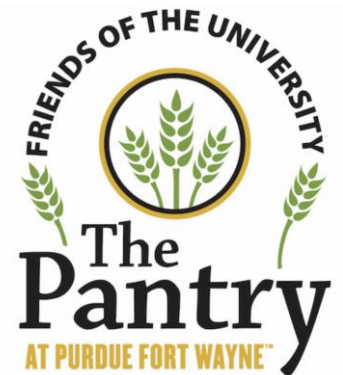
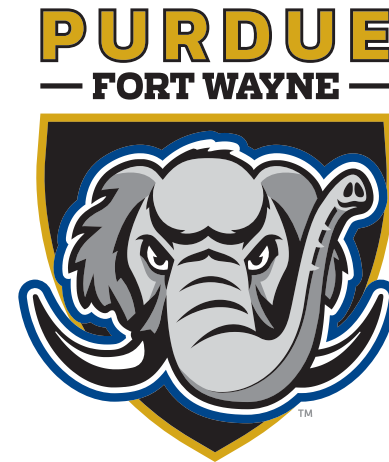
PURDUE FORT WAYNE EVOLUTION

- Indiana University and Purdue University separately held classes in Fort Wayne (part-time students, adult learners, working adults)
- 1950s farmland was purchased and leased to create campus to co-locate IU and Purdue local programs; Kettler Hall opened 1964
- Campus was branded IPFW to offer both IU and Purdue degrees (mix of part-time and full-time students)
- 2016 LSA study recommended IPFW split into separate Purdue and IU entities. Campus primarily to become a Purdue University regional campus with co-located IU programs in health sciences and medical education.
- July 1, 2018, campus rebranded as Purdue University Fort Wayne offering mostly Purdue degrees (90% Purdue, 10% IU)



PURDUE FORT WAYNE FUN FACTS

- Mascot is the Mastodon: Only university with this mascot
- One of only two Metropolitan Universities in the state
- Transitioned Athletics program from Summit League to Horizon League in July 2020
 - Men's basketball: Co-champs of regular season (2021-22)
 - Jon Coffman: Horizon League Coach of the Year (2022)
- PFW named "Tree Campus USA" (2020)
- PFW Disc Golf course named best free course in Indiana
- PFW Food Pantry had 4,159 visits in 2021-22; 82% students
- Student profile flips from 75% PT in 2010 to 82% FT in 2021
- 91% of PFW graduates are employed in Indiana (2021)

- Past Decade: 5 Fulbright Scholars, 4 Gilman Scholars, 1 Goldwater Scholar, 1 Truman Scholar
- PFW named among the best for preparing future elementary educators to teach math (2022)
- PFW Accounting graduates among top 6% nationally in first-time pass rates on CPA exam (2020)
- Indiana State Board of Education approved new licensure programs at PFW to address critical K-12 teacher shortages
- PFW Elementary Education program earns distinction as “exemplar” from NCTQ

The undergraduate elementary teacher preparation program at Purdue University Fort Wayne received top marks from a research and policy organization, making it among the best nationwide in ensuring future educators have the essential content and skills needed to teach mathematics, the campus said in a news release.

The National Council on Teacher Quality, a research and policy organization, regularly evaluates the core requirements and practices of more than 1,100 programs that prepare future elementary teachers, the release said. It most recently assessed programs for their coverage of key math content elementary teachers need, including algebraic thinking and geometry, and how to teach those concepts.

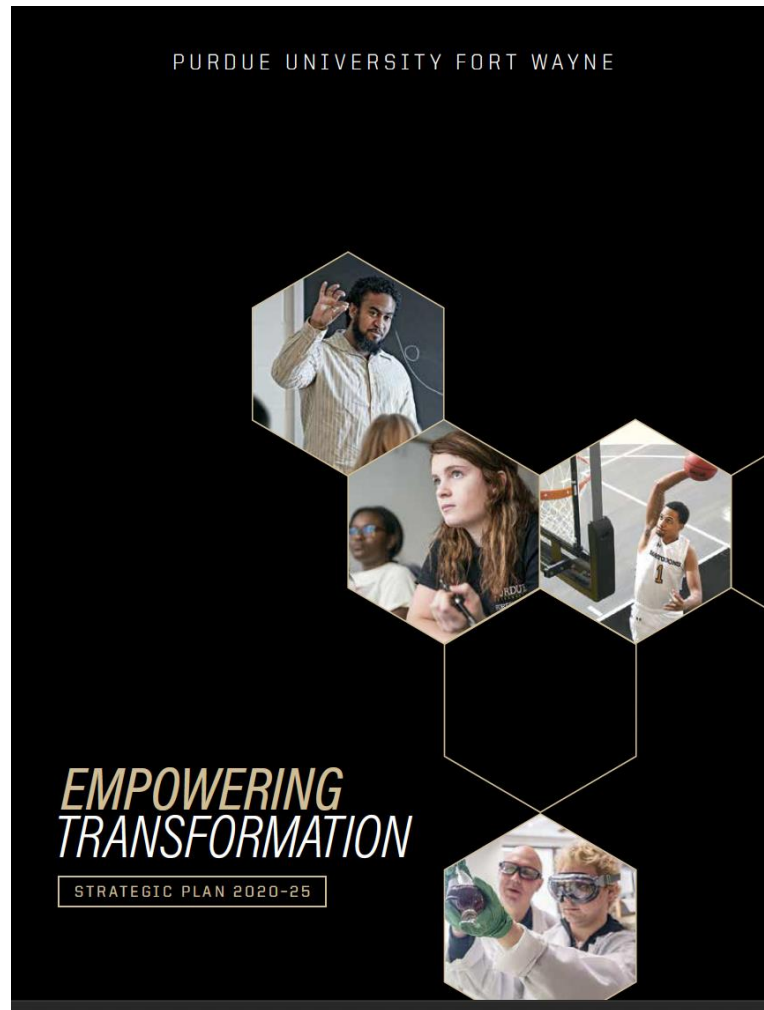


PURDUE FORT WAYNE POINTS OF PRIDE

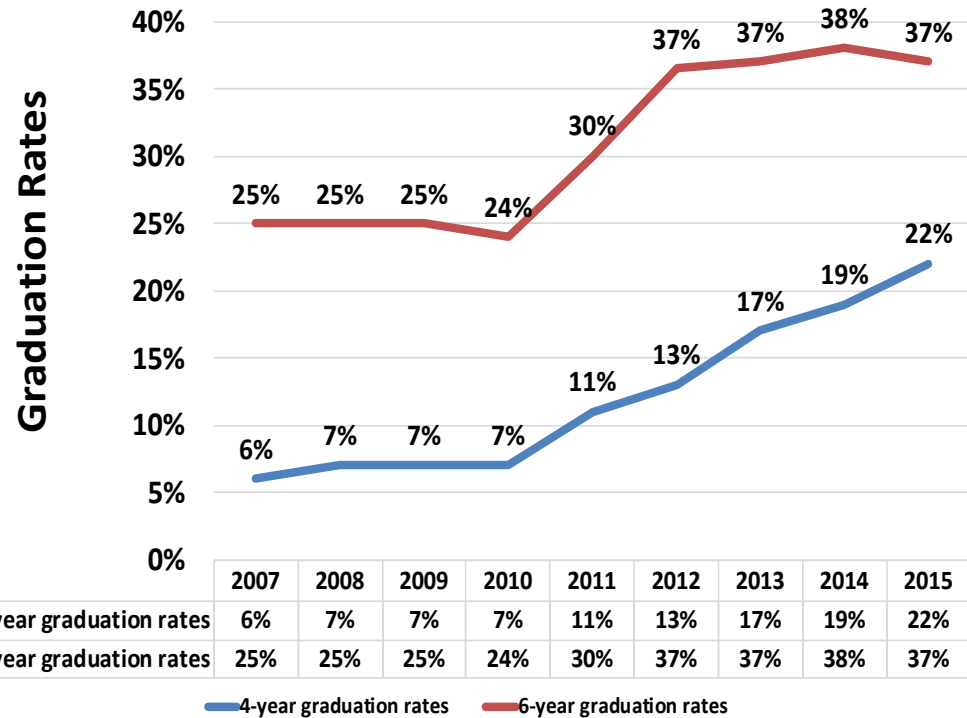

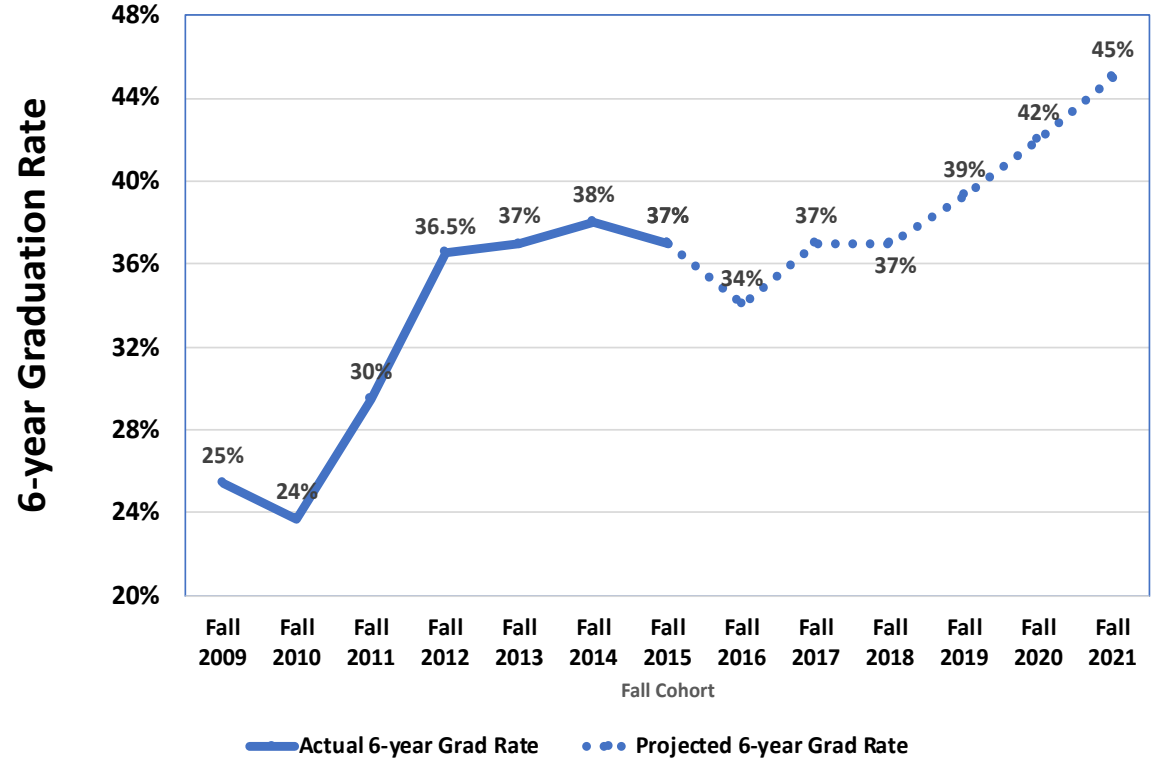

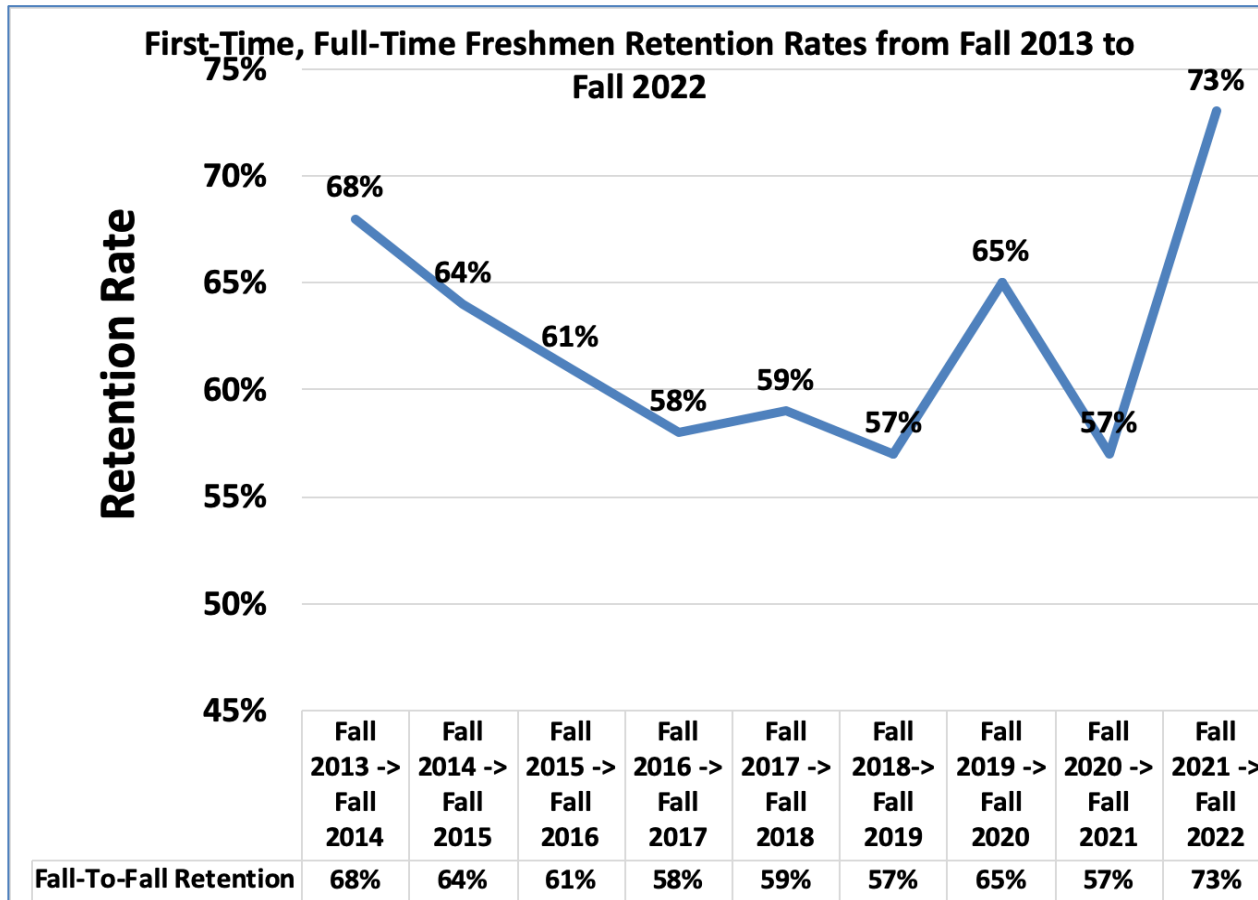
4-year and 6-year Bachelor Degree Graduation Rates from Fall 2007 to Fall 2015

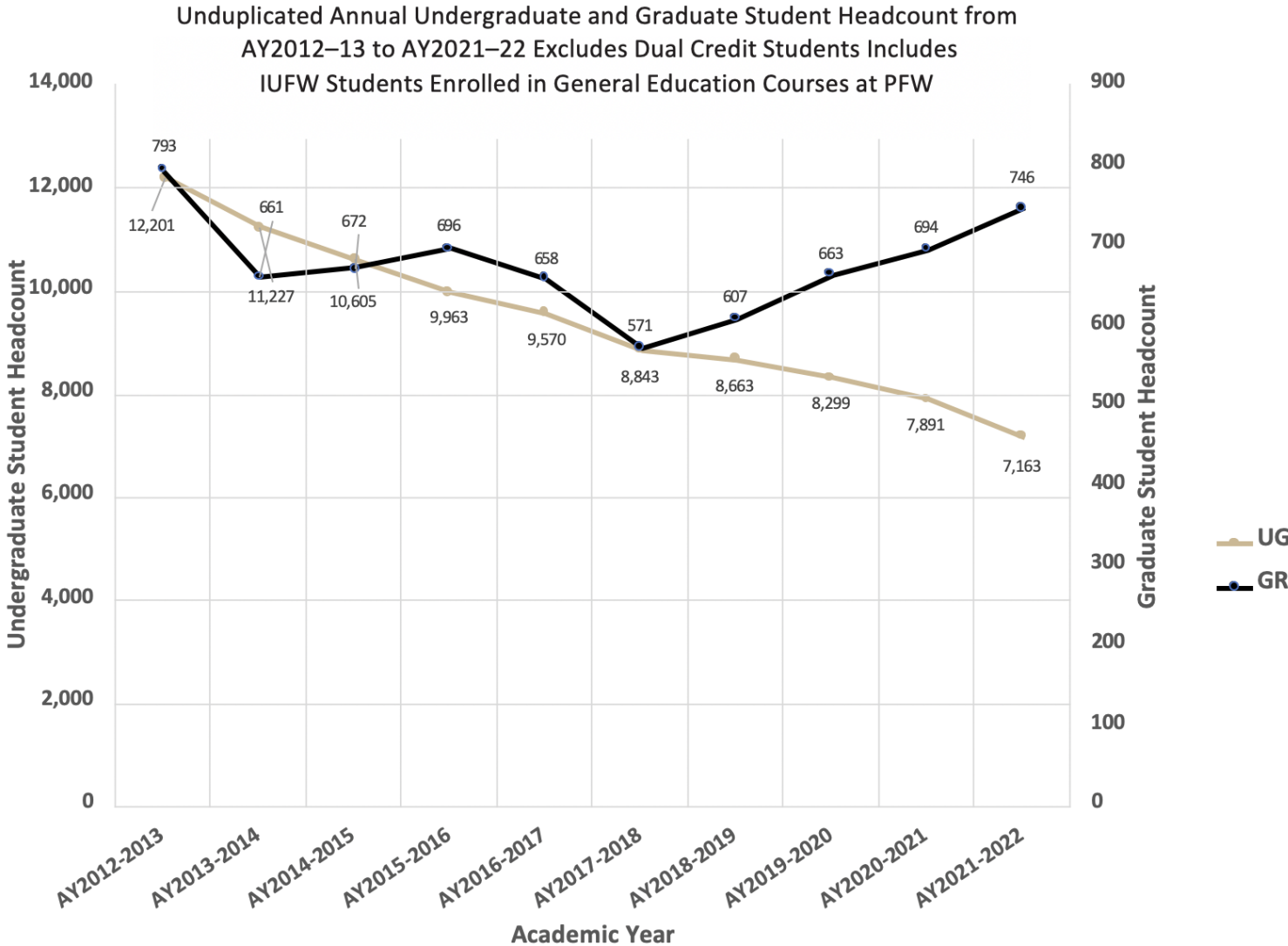

- +17.1%** FALL TO SPRING RETENTION OF BLACK FEMALE STUDENTS

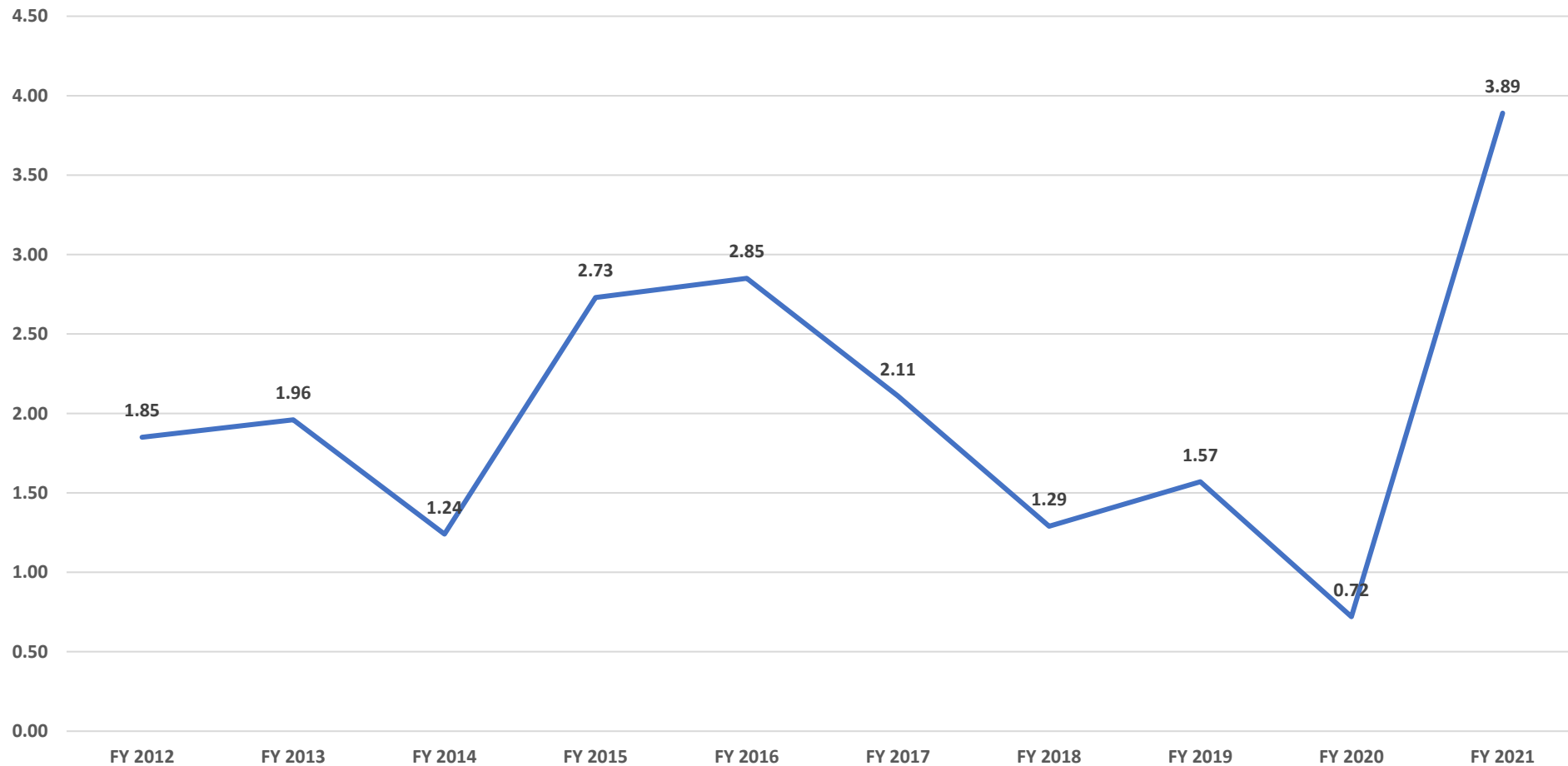
STUDENT SUCCESS ENROLLMENT OUTLOOK

FINANCIAL HEALTH COMPOSITE FINANCIAL INDICATOR

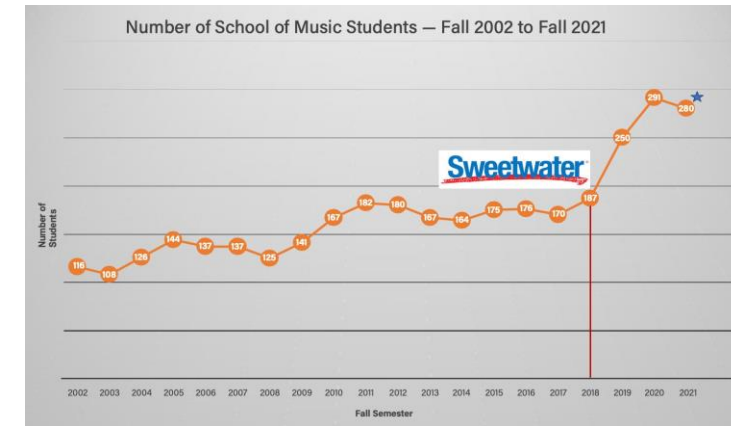
COMPOSITE FINANCIAL INDICATOR (CFI)

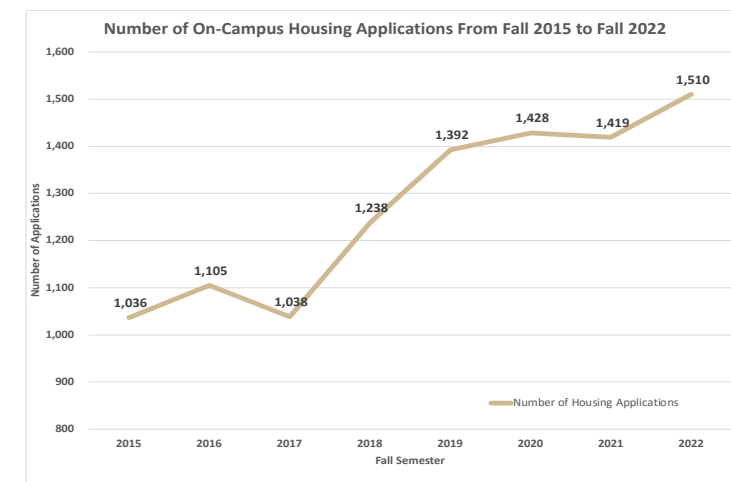
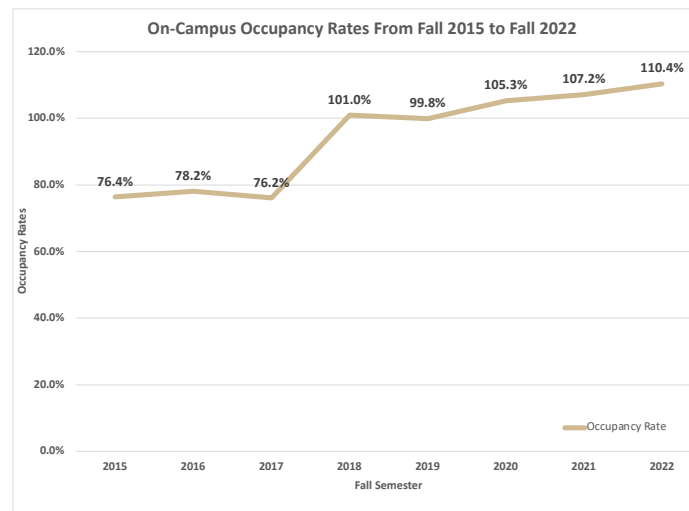
BUILD NEW MUSIC BUILDING
