


### **PURDUE APHASIA LAB 2024 NEWSLETTER**

## STUDY UPDATES AND RESEARCH PRESENTATIONS

**Sentence training in aphasia:** Our NIH-funded research (NIH R01 DC019129) allows us to develop cost-effective and more accessible treatments that can help persons with aphasia (PWA) communicate in sentences. We talk, understand, read, and write in sentences, but most aphasia treatments focus on single words!

We discovered that implicit language learning is a powerful strategy for PWA and that syntax (grammatical rules) is important for gaining cost-effective outcomes.


We appreciate the 90 (& counting!) people with aphasia that have participated in this project so far!






Faculty members of Purdue's Speech, Language and Hearing Sciences department have developed the Aphasia & Dysphagia Data Repository (ADDR).
