VOCABULARY

AS AN INTERNATIONAL SCHOLAR AT PURDUE, YOU WILL HEAR SPECIFIC ISS AND IMMIGRATION VOCABULARY. TO HELP YOU DECIPHER SOME OF THOSE TERMS, BELOW YOU WILL FIND A MINI-DICTIONARY.

myISS

myISS is Purdue University's web portal to immigration services, requests, and benefits for our international student, scholar, and employee community.

e-checkin

Scholars who are beginning a new program at Purdue must complete a mandatory checkin upon their arrival. Your ISS liaison will initiate the process and will let you know if they will meet with you virtually or in-person. The checkin must be approved by ISS within 30 days of the program start date on the DS-2019 and is required before you may obtain a Purdue ID.

USCIS

United States Citizenship and Immigration Services

CBP

Customs and Border Protection - grants admission, status and stay

DOS

Department of State - Operates US Embassies and consulates worldwide and adjudicates applications for visa foils

SEVIS

Student and Exchange Visitor Information System - electronic reporting system that provides the United States Department of Homeland Security with information on international students and scholars in the United States

OBTAINING YOUR DS-2019 OR CERTIFICATE OF ELIGIBILITY (COE)

A DS-2019 is issued by a U.S. government approved institution or organization such as Purdue University and enables you to apply at a US Consulate for a J-1 Visa.

A DS-2019 Identifies:

- Exchange visitor (Section 1)
- Program sponsor (Section 2)
- Brief description of program (Section 2)
- Start and end date (Section 3)
- Category of exchange (Section 4)
- Funding (Section 5)

Throughout your J-1 program, you will receive many emails from ISS. It's very important you read ISS emails thoroughly and if you have any questions email intlscholars@purdue.edu.

Please check that your name and personal information is correct. Read the back of your DS-2019 before signing and then sign, date and keep all versions of your DS-2019s.

You are required to engage in activities related to your program objective at the address listed as Primary Site of Activity in Section 1 of your DS-2019. Before any changes can be made, you must contact ISS. This includes any changes to your funding, program activities, change in supervisor and lab, home address, and worksite address, including if you will be working remotely away from West Lafayette

PAY THE I-901 SEVIS FEE AND APPLY FOR VISA

You must pay the I-901 SEVIS fee before going to the United States embassy or consulate for your visa interview. The SEVIS fee can be paid online at https://www.fmjfee.com/i901fee/index.html. You are responsible for paying all fees associated with obtaining a visa.

 All questions regarding the SEVIS fee also known as the I-901 fee should be directed to the <u>SEVIS Fee FAQ</u> or call 703-603-3400.

Make a visa appointment by following the <u>U.S. Embassy/Consulate instructions</u> to schedule your visa appointment.

- Federal regulations DO NOT permit us to email you your DS-2019. However, you can schedule your visa appointment as soon as you receive a confirmation email from us listing your SEVIS ID and Purdue program number. However, you will need a hard copy of your DS-2019 for your visa appointment.



ARRIVE AT THE PORT OF ENTRY AND ENTER THE US

WHAT TO EXPECT WHEN ENTERING THE U.S. AT A PORT OF ENTRY

Arrival

Be prepared with the following documents:

- Passport
- J-1 Visa (unless exempt from visa requirement)
- DS-2019
- Customs Declaration Form (if applicable)
- They may also ask to see your proof of funding and SEVIS fee payment and your Purdue University invitation letter

We recommend placing these documents in a protective folder for safekeeping. Do not pack your immigration documents in your checked luggage!

Questioning

- You may be fingerprinted and/or photographed
- Officers might ask about your J-1 program and reasons for entering the U.S.
- Officers may determine you require additional screening and ask you to go to secondary inspection. This is okay but it can add significant time to your stay in the airport. You should take this possibility into consideration when planning flight connections.

Per US immigration regulations, you may enter the US up to 30 days prior to the start date on your DS-2019. Your department may delay your start date without you receiving an updated DS-2019. If you are unsure what your start date is please contact your ISS liaison.

TRAVEL TO PURDUE

It's your responsibility to get from the airport to the Purdue campus in West Lafayette, Indiana. The two major cities nearest West Lafayette are Chicago, Illinois and Indianapolis, Indiana. It is recommended that you fly to one of these cities and then secure transportation to West Lafayette using one of these shuttle services.


GET YOUR I-94

Part of the process of admitting a nonimmigrant to the United States is the creation of a Form I-94 record. Form I-94 serves as evidence of a lawful admission and "alien registration" that is required by law.

Whether you are admitted with a paper or electronic I-94, the I-94 should reference the your full name, date and place of entry, your J-1 class of admission, your unique I-94 admission number, and an "admit until" date of "duration of status," indicated by the notation "D/S."

After entering the U.S., please go to www.cbp.gov/I94 to download a copy of your electronic I-94 arrival record. If you cannot locate your electronic I-94, please let your ISS liaison know immediately.

COMPLETE E-CHECKIN

Scholars who are beginning a new program at Purdue are required to complete an online E-checkin with ISS upon their arrival. It must be completed no later than 30 days after the program start date listed on your DS-2019

How do I start my E-checkin?

The online E-checkin is initiated by your ISS Liaison. Please reach out to your ISS liaison to initiate this process.

Who is my ISS liaison?

This individual will be one of your most important contacts while at Purdue. Within Purdue departments, there is a trained ISS liaison who serves as your key contact while at Purdue. If you do not know who your ISS liaison is, please visit our website.

What do I need for my E-checkin?

Your liaison will either ask you to upload your documents before or after your arrival. Either way, you will need to provide your:

- Signed DS-2019
- Signed DS-7002 (All four pages this only applies to J-1 Student Interns)
- J-1 Visa
- Electronic I-94
 - ♦ To obtain your most recent electronic I-94 please visit the <u>I-94 website</u>. If you are unable to download it, let your ISS liaison know immediately
- Proof of Health Insurance
 - ♦ It must meet Department of State requirements and be in English
- Emergency Contact
 - ♦ Family member or close friend. This contact cannot be your Faculty Host
- US Phone Number
- US Home Address

OBTAINING YOUR PURDUE ID

You will need to upload a photo for your Purdue ID Card, please follow the instructions below:

- 1. Submit a photo on the <u>photo submission site</u>
- 2. Wait for the approval email

*If the picture is denied, please upload a new photo for approval

You may pick up your PUID Card from Card Services, which is located in Hovde Hall of Administration, Room 14. You may access the building using the ADA/ handicap entrance on the Southwest corner of HOVD Hall, near Elliott Hall and the Bell Tower. Please note you will be required to wear a face mask and to follow social distancing rules. You will also need to bring a government issued ID card (driver's license or passport). Please also bring your DS2019.

HEALTH INSURANCE

WHY DO YOU NEED HEALTH INSURANCE?

To have access to, and be able to afford, medical care in the US. See the following document for information about the US healthcare system: Link to AT Overview of US Healthcare doc

All J-1 Exchange Visitors and their J-2 dependents are required to have health insurance for their entire stay in the United States. Your health insurance policy must meet minimum coverage levels set forth by the U.S. Department of State (USDOS) in the USDOS Welcome Brochure http://jlvisa.state.gov/wp-content/uploads/2015/03/Brochure-The-Exchange-Visitor-Program

- \$100,000 for each sickness or illness (including maternity/pregnancy care)
- \$100,000 for each accident or injury
- \$50,000 for medical evacuation
- \$25,000 for repatriation
- \$500 deductible or less

Your policy's coverage must become effective on the same day you enter the U.S., and you must have health insurance coverage for the duration of your J program or until you leave the U.S. Failure to do so would violate your non-immigrant status and you would no longer be eligible to participate in Purdue University's J-1 program.

HEALTH INSURANCE

WHERE MAY I PURCHASE HEALTH INSURANCE?

It may be easier to purchase insurance before you arrive in the US

- If you will be paid by Purdue University, check with your department or offer letter to see if Purdue insurance will cover you
- You will not be able to purchase from Purdue

You may purchase insurance from a private agency in your home country or from a US based insurance company that issues insurance for visitors to the US. Here are some frequently used companies.

A Note about Seven Corners Inc.:

It is the Scholar's responsibility to select an insurance plan that best covers the unique circumstances of the Scholar and any accompanying spouse/children. However, Purdue's Benefits team has negotiated with Seven Corners Insurance (hhttps://www.sevencorners.com/groupenrollment/quote? a=b76dc64c-90e4-425a-89a4-5e64a98db0bf&p=2038#/quote)to design a plan that satisfies regulatory requirements and that also has the Purdue University Student Health center (PUSH) in its network of providers (which is on campus and easily accessible). Access to PUSH may also streamline certain other support during COVID. Both the scholar and their accompanying family may access PUSH, if approved to do so by Seven Corners.

212(E) TWO YEAR HOME COUNTRY RESIDENCY REQUIREMENT

What is 212 (e) Two-Year Home Country Residency Requirement?

• 212(e) is an agreement between the U.S. and your home country to ensure your home country benefits from your exchange experience

If you are subject to 212(e):

- You will be required to physically reside in your home country for 2 years before returning to the U.S. in specific visa statuses including H, L, K and permanent residence
- You may be able to return to the US in other statuses such as tourist or F-1 before fulfilling the home residency requirement
- You are not eligible to request a change of status inside the U.S.

What causes someone to be subject to 212 (e)?

- Department of State Exchange Visitor Skills List
- · Government Funding in part or in whole by the home government or US government
- J-2 dependent of a J-1 Exchange Visitor who is subject to 212(e)

How Do I Know If I Am Subject to 212 (e)?

- The consular official may note on the DS-2019 if you are subject to 212(e) and for what reason you are subject
- Your visa stamp may have a note stating you are subject to 212(e)

What if I don't believe I should be subject to 212 (e)?

• It is possible to request an advisory opinion from the U.S. Department of State.

Is there any way to request that I not be subject to 212(e)?

• It is possible to request a 212(e) waiver, however, you will be ineligible for extension of the DS-2019 once a waiver is approved. Purdue ISS will not provide waiver advice or help with waiver applications.
