

This speaker series features distinguished Native American, Alaska Native, and Native Hawaiian Purdue alumni who are making outstanding contributions in Native American communities and accomplishments in their profession. RaeLynn Butler is from the Muscogee Creek Nation in Tulsa, Oklahoma, she received her bachelor's degree from Haskell Indian Nations University and her master's degree in Botany from the Botany and Plant Pathology Department, College of Agriculture. She currently serves as the Manager of the Historic and Cultural Preservation Department with the Muscogee Creek Nation.

Natalie Diaz was born and raised in the Fort Mojave Indian Village in Needles, California, on the banks of the Colorado River. She is Mojave and an enrolled member of the Gila River Indian Tribe. Her first poetry collection, When My Brother Was an Aztec, was published by Copper Canyon Press. She is a MacArthur Fellow, a Lannan Literary Fellow, and a Native Arts Council Foundation Artist Fellow. She was awarded a Bread Loaf Fellowship, the Holmes National Poetry Prize, a Hodder Fellowship, a PEN/Civitella Ranieri Foundation Residency, as well as being awarded a US Artists Ford Fellowship.
