

Federal Indian Boarding School (bats) was a Federal Indian Boarding School that operated on the southwest Navajo Reservation from 1909 to 1942. Through an analysis of Diné oral history and a critical review of historical records. Dr. Davina Two Bears (Dine') documented the history of the OLBS and how Diné children resisted and survived assimilation in the early 20th century. Two Bears received her Ph.D. in Anthropology from Indiana University-Bloomington, completed he residency as the "Charles Eastman Fellow" at Dartmouth College, and was selected as the 2019-2020 "Anne Ray Fellow" at the School for Advance Research in Santa Fe. 
