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

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

Purdue University's <u>Institute for Digital Forestry</u>, housed in the Department of Forestry and Natural Resources, merges digital technology and cross-disciplinary knowledge to revolutionize forest management and conservation. The institute is a collaboration of investigators from the colleges of Agriculture, Engineering, Liberal Arts and Science with Purdue Libraries and Polytechnic Institute, integrating expertise in artificial intelligence, machine learning, computer applications and modeling, geosciences, satellite and drone sensing platforms, social sciences, and education for sustainable and equitable rural and urban forest management.

Where did Denim Day come from?

In 1992, an 18 year old girl came forward in Italy about her experience of sexual assault. During trial, the defense used the "alibi" that since the survivor was wearing tight jeans when she was assaulted, she must have aided her attacker in removing the jeans, which made the act "consensual". This decision sparked widespread outrage and is now commemorated with Denim Day.

What is Denim Day?

Denim Day is a day of action and awareness held on the last Wednesday of Sexual Assault Awareness Month where people are encouraged to wear denim to combat victim blaming and educate on sexual violence.





CARE will be tabling and painting denim from 12-2pm at the Bell Tower and 3-5pm at Krach Lawn. We hope to see you there!




