 - Gather ideas for how to prep for it.
 - Learn about the costs and the costs of various methods of preparation.
- Your Application
 - o What will be on it?
 - o When does it open?
 - What information about activities will you need to provide so you know what details to track?
 - o What is the prompt for your personal statement?
 - o How long is your personal statement? Start a file with ideas of things you might want to include.
