Likewise, if SPS receives communication from an agency, they will notify directly relevant principal investigators if action needs to be taken.

The website has the current status for each agency and will be updated as new information is available.

Limited Submission: The Conservation, Food & Health Foundation The Conservation, Food and Health Foundation seeks to protect the environment, improve food production, and promote public health in Africa, Asia, the Caribbean, Latin America, and the Middle East. The Foundation supports projects and applied research that: Generate local or regional solutions to problems affecting the quality of the environment and human life; Advance local leadership and promote professional development in the conservation, agricultural, and health sciences; Develop the capacity of local organizations and coalitions; and Address challenges in the field. The Foundation funds applied research, pilot projects, new initiatives, training, and technical assistance, rather than ongoing support for programs that are already well underway. Spencer Foundation Small Education Research Projects

The Small Research Grants on Education Program supports education research projects that will contribute to the improvement of education, broadly conceived, with budgets up to \$50,000 for projects ranging from one to five years. This program is "field-initiated" in that proposal submissions are not in response to a specific request for a particular research topic, discipline, design, method, or location. Our goal for this program is to support rigorous, intellectually ambitious and technically sound research that is relevant to the most pressing questions and compelling opportunities in education. Pls and Co-Pls may not submit more than one research proposal to the Spencer Foundation at a time. This restriction applies to the Small Grants Program, Large Grants Program, Racial Equity Research Grants Program, and Research-Practice Partnership Program. Deadline: December 15

The CART Fund invites interested applicants from within the United States only to submit a Letter-of-Intent (LOI) that includes sufficient detail to communicate the importance of your study as well as information on its feasibility. Proposals should be distinct from those projects designed to increase knowledge in a well-established area unless it is intended to extend previous discoveries toward new directions or applications. Breakthrough T1D Development of Continuous C-Peptide Monitoring Technologies

This RFA aims to advance the development of technologies for continuous C-peptide monitoring, primarily through early-stage and preclinical studies, with potential application across the stages of type 1 diabetes (T1D). We seek sensor platforms capable of detecting C-peptide at physiological concentrations with sufficient sensitivity, specificity, and stability for real-world, longitudinal use. While the primary focus is on continuous monitoring, proposals that enable high-frequency or at-home testing will also be considered, provided they represent clear improvements over existing methods and support practical, scalable assessment of beta cell function.
