Senate Chair's Remarks:

Chair Susan South welcomed the Senate to the Second Meeting of the Academic year.

Chair South focused her remarks on the upcoming national election. She was heartened by the email from Purdue encouraging all eligible voters to vote. The message also emphasized that the University is committed to offering voting site choices for all future election cycles.

Chair South noted that the U.S. is unique among modern, industrialized, higher-income democracies for having among the lowest percent of turn-out among the eligible voter population. About 62% vote in national elections. Experts point to reliance on individual voting registration, voter ID requirements, and polling place accessibility. The 2020 election had among the highest voter turn-out in over a century, perhaps because states made voting easier during the COVID pandemic. When it is easier to vote, citizens take advantage of it. Chair South presented a slide showing the breakdown of voter percentages by age group over the last 30 years. The oldest age group had the highest percentage while the youngest age group had the lowest percentage. With arguably the greatest stake in our national elections, why are our youngest voters the least likely to vote? Political researchers point to voter apathy and distrust in our election system for the low voter turn-out.

Can we, as a college community dedicated to education, decrease that apathy by demonstrating the importance of voting and giving our students the tools to participate fully in our democracy? Chair South noted that colleges have come under attack by the conservative right and the liberal left. She mentioned the recent passing of SB202 and suggested it was a solution in search of a problem. The bill's sponsor might have taken time to talk with neighbors and constituents to learn about going into a college classroom and sharing subject matter knowledge free of any political biases. The fact that the bill passed should not discourage us from encouraging political participation by our students. The most recent former President of Purdue was invested in every undergraduate knowing about the privileges and responsibilities of citizenship.

The faculty, staff, and administration also benefit from on-campus polling places at their place of employment. She suggested that Purdue could host candidate debates and assist our community with voter registration. It is the definition of a Land Grant mission for Purdue to be a center for civic duty and opportunity.

Chair South has heard from parents, alumni/ae, local constituents, local representatives of national political parties, the ACLU, and the League of Women Voters in support of an on-campus day of voting. She appreciates the effort to provide buses and golf carts to take students to the voting center at City Hall. However, we can do more.

Any hurdle between a person and a polling place reduces their likelihood of voting. Along with the Senate leadership, she stands prepared to help reduce hurdles, work with local election boards, ensure on-campus day of voting, and encourage students, staff, and faculty to take advantage of all manners of voting to participate in our civic right. She encouraged all members of the Purdue community to vote.

Purdue President's Remarks

President Mung Chiang presented his remarks while in attendance at a national meeting.

President Chiang echoed the comments of Chair South. He said we all appreciate the Senate's support of the University's application with the Board of Elections for voting sites for an on-campus voting day.

President Chiang highlighted some of the ongoing support for the research efforts. He noted that EVP for Research Karen Plaut would expand on his comments.

- 1. Expanded SPS staffing by 25% based on suggestions from faculty.
- 2. Purchased ~\$10 million of software to aid faculty in writing and administering proposals. The PERA system is now operational and should enhance productivity.
- 3. With BoT approval, we will put forth a plan for the Life Sciences Interdisciplinary Research Building. This \$160 million proposal will be the top priority in our bi-annual request to the State legislature. If approved, there will be major renovation for the Departments related to Chemistry that are in four Colleges. Upgrades to Chemistry facilities are overdue.
- 4. We have rolled out initiatives and incentives to encourage publishing books as varied examples of scholarship. We want to support faculty in writing these publications.
- 5. He mentioned hosting dinners to present internal awards for teaching, research, engagement, and inventors. He would like to see Purdue faculty compete more for national awards to get a larger share than is currently awarded. We will increase efforts at all levels to achieve increases. More details will be provided in the Senate minutes.

President Chiang wrapped up his remarks by giving a shout out to EVP Plaut's office for their efforts in the research arena.
